


EGC GARDEN TOUR JULY 21, 2018



Designer Plant Combinations

Curlicue Artemisia

Artemisia versicolor 'Seafoam'

Low, silver, and very aromatic, curlicue Artemisia is a fine growing companion to giant-flowered purple sage. Known for its "foamy" curling leaves, curlicue adds a soft, lacy contrast to surrounding plants that are more stiff, upright and architectural. It's an interesting alternative to the more common 'Powis Castle' artemisia.

8" tall; 4" wide Zone 4

This combination gets the Silver Medal for Deer proofing!



Giant-flowered purple sage Salvia pachyphylla

A newcomer to cultivation, giant-flowered purple sage has had an impact on the garden scene in the West. Colorado seedsman Alan Bradshaw supplied David Salman with the first seeds for this California native plant. The sterling plant with iridescent purple blooms has since appeared in plantings at the Denver Botanical Garden. It will take all the sun and heat you can throw at it, and it prefers well-drained soil. It responds well to a shearing in late summer after it blooms.

3' tall; 30" wide Zone 5




Canyon penstemon Penstemon pseudospectabilis Handsome, triangular, toothed leaves and towering, hot pink flower spires characterize this rugged southwestern native. In spring to early summer, hummingbirds visit the tubular flowers; later, the plant produces copious seed. Cutting back the spend bloom stalks (and collecting seed!) keeps the plant's rosette tidy when it's out of bloom. Needs good drainage and full sun to part shade.

> 1'-3' tall; 1'-2' wide Zone 5

Buckwheat Select

This plant pairing uses a design trick that works nearly every time. Take a low-growing, mat-forming plant, sidle it up against a strong, upright grower with a contrasting flower color and foliage, and you'll be treated to a powerful effect. In this case, two durable Rocky Mountain plants — a spectacular, glowing buckwheat called Kannah Creek and a canyon penstemon — are the stars of a show acted out in vivid yellow and hot pink, with white native fleabane as a bit player. This assortment is nestled into a slope of Colorado horticulturist Panayoti Kelaidis's Denver garden.





Kannah Creek buckwheat

Eriogonum umbellatum var. aureum 'Psdowns' (Kannah Creek)

Panayoti Kelaidis is well known as a plant explorer: a man who finds an exceptional plant in the wild, introduces it to horticulture, and shines a bight spotlight on it. This is what he helped do with Kannah Creek buckwheat, a mat-forming ground cover from Colorado's Grand Mesa known for masses of yellow, popcorn shaped flowers that appear to hover over the plant on wiry stems. Kannah Creek, chosen for the Plant Select program, is distinguished from other sulphur buckwheats by its brighter yellow flowers and foliage that turns purplered in autumn and winter. Adaptable to a wide range of soil conditions, including clay, as long as reasonably good drainage is provided.


